The California Department of Health Care Services Opens New Behavioral Health Care Center in Los Angeles and Breaks Ground on Another in Modesto

Behavioral Health Patients Receive All-in-One Services at L.A. Restorative Care Village

The Los Angeles General Medical Center [Restorative Care Village](#) is a \$68.5 million investment to provide a modern setting for Los Angeles County residents where they can heal. In 2021, Health Net made a \$100,000 grant to support an outdoor green space and art installations at the village to improve psychological health and wellness of clients and residents.

The Restorative Care Village provides access to a **complete spectrum of clinical care and supportive services** on one campus. This includes:

- Recuperative and respite housing
- Mental health care
- Substance use disorder treatment
- Other transitional and support services

These services allow patients to **heal and safely enter back into their communities**.

The project includes:

Recuperative Care Center (RCC) – One building with 96 beds. It will provide clinically enriched interim housing with:

- On-site nursing
- Health oversight
- Case management

RCC will also connect people discharged from county health facilities, or those with a shaky housing outlook, to more stable options.

Residential Treatment Programs (RTP) – Four buildings with 64 beds. Two of the four RTP buildings opened in October 2023.

As of now, about two dozen community-based organizations (CBOs) can connect with people in the village. Thirteen CBOs have physical spaces to connect people with services.

Children and Youth Have Access to New Mental Health Center in Central Valley

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) joined the [Center for Human Services](#) on June 10 for the start of a **new outpatient behavioral health center in Modesto, California**. The center will serve children, youth, and their families in the Central Valley.

DHCS granted the Center for Human Services **more than \$5 million** to build a safe space to address gaps in mental health and substance abuse treatment. This will allow the Center for Human Services to serve more than **1,425 new community members** with much needed resources each year.

The Center for Human Services has provided mental health services in Stanislaus County since 1989. It's one of the largest behavioral health service providers in the county. It provides both school and community-based services and has Medi-Cal provider agreements with Stanislaus County Behavioral Health and the Medi-Cal managed care plans in the county – Health Net, Health Plan of San Joaquin and Kaiser Permanente.

These are the first of many California-based community treatment sites that are now under construction in [49 counties](#). Even more sites are planned to be funded and built in 2025 and 2026 thanks to recently approved Proposition 1 bonds.

FOOD INSECURITY

Millions of California Kids Can Receive Meals This Summer Thanks to New Food Program

This summer, millions of California families with school aged children can buy more food with **California SUN Bucks** (aka Summer-EBT). SUN Bucks works just like the CalFresh program – providing \$40 per month for food during June, July and August 2024 (\$120 total).

Who qualifies?

Children who:

- Get free or reduced-price school meals through a school meal application. Or through an Alternative Income Form.
- Have CalFresh, CalWORKs or Medi-Cal.

California Child Health Care Services Simplified in July

Training for Children's Presumptive Eligibility (CPE) and Newborn Gateway Portals

On July 1, the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) launched the Children's Presumptive Eligibility (CPE) and newborn gateway provider portals to improve access to coverage and care for new families.

CPE portal. Providers may grant temporary, full-scope coverage to qualified applicants through this portal. The portal replaces the Child Health and Disability Prevention (CHDP) gateway portal.

Newborn gateway portal. All qualified CPE providers are required to use this portal to report infants born to Medi-Cal or Medi-Cal Access Program members in their facilities. This includes:

- Hospitals
- Birth centers
- Other settings

Those facilities report births within 72 hours or 24 hours after discharge, whichever is sooner.

Training is required to use these portals. Providers can sign up through the [Medi-Cal Learning Portal](#). There they will find recorded trainings that appear via the date/time they are available.
