- Residential Treatment Programs (RTP) Four buildings with 64 beds. Two of the four RTP buildings opened in October 2023.

As of now, about two dozen community-based organizations (CBOs) can connect with people in the village. Thirteen CBOs have physical spaces to connect people with services.

The California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) joined the Center for Human Services on June 10 for the start of a new outpatient behavioral health center in Modesto, California. The center will serve children, youth, and their families in the Central Valley.

DHCS granted the Center for Human Services more than \$5 million to build a safe space to address gaps in mental

largest behavioral health service providers in the county. It provides both school and community-based services and has Medi-Cal provider agreements with Stanislaus County Behavioral Health and the Medi-Cal managed care plans in the county - Health Net, Health Plan of San Joaquin and Kaiser Permanente. Training for Children's Presumptive Eligibility (CPE) and Newborn Gateway Portals

On July 1, the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) launched the Children's Presumptive Eligibility (CPE) and newborn gateway provider portals to improve access to coverage and care for new families.

Those facilities report births within 72 hours or 24 hours after discharge, whichever is sooner.
